SCUBA divers and snorklers search for gold stars in depths between ten and fifty feet in the Casino Dive Park in the city of Avalon. The gold stars are searched for in a scenic area of rock and kelp formations and wrecks during an hour and a half period. Divers who find and return a gold star win a prize and a one pound chocolate star. Raffles are held for diver and non-diver prizes.

CERT is a positive and realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations where citizens might initially be on their own and their actions can make a difference. The CERT course will benefit any citizen who attends regardless of whether or not they become a volunteer. After taking this course, the individual will be better prepared to respond to and cope with the aftermath of a disaster. Through training, they will learn how to manage utilities, put out small fires and operate a fire extinguisher, provide basic medical aid, search for and rescue victims safely and organize themselves and spontaneous volunteers to be effective. In Avalon, the CERT is also used for traffic and crowd control during events and giving assistance to emergency responders during fires and other localized emergencies. American Red Cross training is also offered to CERT members who would like to increase their knowledge in emergency situations.

As the CERT concept has taken hold across the country, however, CERT's have become much more than originally envisioned. CERT's have proven themselves to be an active and vital part of the communities' preparedness and response capability. For example, CERT's have been used to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> * Distribute and/or install smoke detectors and batteries to the elderly and/or disabled * Assist with evacuations and traffic control * Promote community awareness of potential hazards and preparedness measures * Supplement staffing at special events such as parades * Act as victims in training exercises <p>The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program is an all-risk, all-hazard training. The La Puente Valley Regional Occupational Program Provides an instructor, at \$20.00 an hour, who is certified in bicycle repair.</p> <p>The bike shop program was started to provide high school students with a vocational program in which they would receive training in bicycle repair and maintenance. When they complete the course, the student will receive a certificate of completion for the course, which will enable them to work in the bicycle industry.</p> <p>Students receive approximately 4-6 hours of instruction a week for a period of one year. After completing the course the student will, in turn, mentor and help train other students.</p> <p>We anticipate refurbishing 200–250 bicycles a year. The sport of fencing is fast and athletic, a far cry from the choreographed bouts you see on film or on the stage. Instead of swinging from a chandelier or leaping from balconies, you will see two fencers performing an intense dance on a six-foot-by-forty-foot strip. The movement is so fast the touches are scored electrically - more like Star Wars than Errol Flynn.</p> <p>The Weapons: Foil, épée and sabre are the three weapons used in the sport of fencing. While it is not unusual for fencers to compete in all three events, they generally choose to develop their skills in one weapon. Until recently, women were permitted to compete only in foil, but now the USFA & FIE offer national competitions for women in épée and sabre. Women's épée was added to the World Championships in 1989 and was held for the first time at the Olympic Games in 1996.</p> <p>Foil and épée are point-thrusting weapons. Sabre is a point-thrusting as well as a cutting weapon. The target areas differ for the three weapons, though all three are scored electrically.</p>

Both of these beginner levels make use of kits and shells available from the All-American. The program also provides the Sheriff's Department with additional human resources, and opens an important avenue of understanding with an energetic, concerned society of young people.</p> <p>To qualify for the position of Deputy Explorer, you must have at least a "C" average in your schoolwork, be between the ages of 15-18, and be of good moral character with no serious arrest record. You must also meet the same basic physical requirements as a Deputy Sheriff. The candidate selection process includes an oral interview and a medical examination.</p> <p>Deputy Explorers assist regular deputies by performing duties such as report writing, bicycle programs, crowd assistance at parades and civic events, anti-crime campaigns, search missions, fingerprinting, statistical computations, and other community related functions.</p> <p>Deputy Explorers are non-compensated, but completely insured while in training or on duty. The training program consists of over 180 hours of instruction in an academy setting. The training is held on Saturdays, and covers topics including demeanor, firearms safety, community relations, narcotics, police procedures, self defense, and criminal law. The trainees are required to undergo drill and physical training, as well as their classroom work. In May of 2004, the first grant was approved, along with additional funding from the City of Santa Clarita. Each subsequent year, a new grant application has been submitted, resulting in additional funding.</p> <p>As of January, 2005, the Station's Off-Road Enforcement Team has conducted 88 dedicated OHV operations, resulting in over 2300 contacts of OHV enthusiasts. The team has also issued approximately 2850 warnings and over 700 citations for illegal OHV activity.</p> <p>The Santa Clarita Station's Off-Road Enforcement Team consists of two sergeants and six deputies that are trained in the operation of the station's eight dual-purpose motorcycles. The off-road operations are conducted several times per month throughout all parts of the City, as well as in unincorporated areas of the Santa Clarita Valley.</p>
